



## Instructions to Presenters

### Case Study Teams

Case study teams have 30 minutes in which to make a presentation of their work. The presentation will be followed by a 45 minute discussion. So long as the sessions stay within 75 minutes the timing can be flexible.

The presentation should include the following:

- the reason for undertaking the case study
  - what are the findings expected to change?;
- the methods used
  - why where they chosen?;
- preliminary results, if any
  - what do they tell us?;
  - plans for analysis and dissemination of the results; and,
- questions for discussion.

As the objective of the session is to learn about the work and how the outcome can be improved, any concerns should be raised so that the trainers and other participants can try to address them.

Discussion will not be limited to the 45 minutes as team members are encouraged to continue discussions with trainers and other participants during the breaks and free time during the three days of training.

### Graduate Students

Graduate students have 15 minutes to make a presentation and each graduate student session will have two presentations followed by a 30 minute discussion. As the discussion is an important part of the training, students are expected to keep their presentations within the 15 minute limit.

The presentation should include the following:

- the topic of the thesis and the supervisor;
- the reason for doing the research;
  - what are the findings expected to change?
- the intended contribution of the IDRC funded empirical work to the research;
- methods used
  - why were they chosen?
- anticipated results; and,
- questions for discussion.

As with the case study presentations, discussion is expected to continue throughout the workshop.
